### Incumbent's Report

Just a couple of weeks ago, I said that my hope for St Peter's is that we'd become an

increasingly **fruitful** community...

But I'm gradually realising that growing abundant fruit doesn't happen overnight. It takes time, care, attention, and a concerted effort to ensure the conditions are conducive to growth.

I sometimes feel like things can move frustratingly slowly at St Peter's!...the impatient part of me wants everything to be 'sorted' (whatever that means) now! now! now!...but as I reflect on how things have developed over the last three years, maybe slow and steady really is the better way? Because this year we've seen noticeable signs of growth and fruitfulness.

Maybe it's felt slow because we've just been doing our bit and trusting God for his miracle of growth rather that attempting to force things into being? Afterall, it's only God who can make things grow, and in this season the Holy Spirit seems to be doing a new thing not only here in Evesham, but across our nation.

In a recent report called 'The Quiet Revival' looking at the state of the church in the UK it says:

'In 2018, just 4% of 18-24 year olds said they attended church at least monthly. Today this has risen to 16% with young men increasing from 4 to 21% and young women from 3-12%.

This is now the second most likely age group to attend church'

As I've said before, I often get a bit twitchy when people say: 'revival's coming!' and whether what we're seeing in this moment is the beginnings of true revival in our nation, only time will tell, but what we can say for certain is that something's shifted in the cultural landscape and there's currently a significant resurgence in curiosity about faith among young people, and they're beginning to look to the Church once again for answers. But let's be clear about something...This is not something the Church has achieved through its own brilliance. This has not come about through a fancy strategy. This is the work of the Holy Spirit and ever since I read this report, the thought that's been swirling around in my mind is 'are we ready to welcome them in?'

St Peter's new Mission Statement is:

Worshipping Jesus.
Growing Disciples.
Journeying with the Curious.

And whilst this was discerned and developed before the 'Quiet Revival' report was published, it feels to me like the timing couldn't be better, because as young people begin to return, they'll be hungry to see, hear, and experience something entirely different to the secular culture that many of them will have grown up with...

What they'll need from us is:

- To see an unashamedly Christ-centred community where Worshipping Jesus is at the centre of everything we do.
- Examples of **Growing Disciples**, committed to holiness and who are 'bearing good fruit' and living in contrast to what the world has to offer.
- People patiently and lovingly Journeying with the Curious, hearing their questions, and walking with them as they explore.

For decades, the story of the western Church has been one of seemingly inevitable decline, but the tide is very definitely turning.

This is an exciting season, not just for our church, but for *The* Church.

Let's remain committed to nurturing the right conditions for growth. Let's continue to place our trust in God - the only one who can grow abundant fruit, and let's be expectant that he will do great things among us.

# Parish of St Peter's, Bengeworth Annual Parochial Church Meeting Minutes

(Sunday 28th April 2024 at 3.30pm in Church House, Bengeworth)

Revd. Andy Smith in the chair.

### **Opening:**

Andy Smith welcomed those attending the meeting.

Apologies: Phil and Tina Cooper, Roz Harvey, Chris and Emma Pettifer, Jane Richards.

Those attending the APCM joined together in prayer, giving thanks for what God has done through St Peter's and the local community in the past year.

Highlights mentioned included: baptisms, the supportive church family, the YouNite youth group, the appointment of Jayne (our church organist), the success of joint Sunday services, and the Alpha course.

Revd Andy Smith advised those attending of the roles that will be voted on during this APCM and gave an overview of the responsibilities for each position: Church wardens, Deanery Synod Reps, and PCC Members.

### Annual Meeting of Parishioners

### **Approval of Last Year's Meeting Minutes:**

Proposed by Tim Clack, seconded by Tessa Bartlett, all in favour. Objections none. Abstentions none.

#### **Election of Church Wardens:**

A special thanks was given to Dave Cockram for his years of service in the role of church warden. Thanks were also given to Steve Bramley for his hard work and support of the church and Andy personally.

Dave Cockram is standing down as church warden for personal reasons. Andy and those at the meeting gave thanks to Dave for his outstanding work and everything he has done to support Andy and the church.

Steve Bramley has expressed interest to continue being a churchwarden. Steve has been nominated and seconded already – and duly appointed as warden.

The church is currently lacking one additional Warden and there have been no applications yet. Attendees present at the meeting were asked and no one expressed interest.

### **Annual Parochial Church Meeting:**

### **Approval of Last Year's Meeting Minutes:**

Proposed by Sandra Cockram and seconded by Shelagh Moore, all voted in favour – no objections or abstentions.

#### **Matters arising:**

None.

#### **Electoral Roll Report:**

The report was given to those present. 91 people are on the church role, which is a slight decrease from last year (down from 96).

### **Treasurer's Report:** (provided by Tim Clack)

Thank you to Mike Freer (retired treasurer) for all of his tireless work looking after the accounts for many years.

There has been a delay in communication from the auditor of accounts and we have not yet received these in full. Accounts will follow on soon after this meeting and will be circulated to the church/freely available for inspection within the church.

Income has increased in the past year, and despite an also increased expenditure, the church has a £8000 surplus compared to last year.

The Parish Giving Scheme donations have increased- now totalling approximately £3000 per month. Tim asked those attending if they are thinking of giving to please consider utilising the parish giving scheme as gift aid is more easily applied to donations.

The parish share was paid in full.

The John Martin Charity is financially a big help to the church. We have about £24000 to spend this year. Funds from this charity are intended mainly for propagation of the gospel. A special project fund will help to pay for new church carpeting (75% of expected cost).

Ministry share: is expected to increase soon because the end of the renewal project funding coming up. This will be approximately £36,000 this year, £47,000 the next, and £58,000 the year after.

The church received a substantial financial gift which is being used as the ARK fund (Acts of radical kindness) totalling £6,500. This is intended to bless the local community. The PCC are discussing how this project will work, and planning is in the initial stages. Attendees were asked to contribute any ideas for use of the fund.

Mission spending: the church aims to give back to local, national, and international causes. The PCC will discuss the budget for giving. Attendees were asked to contribute any ideas for charities we could support.

Overall summary: the church accounts are looking healthy and are moving in the right direction.

Questions opened to the floor. None.

Andy Smith gave thanks to Tim Clack for his work over the past year, with recognition of the huge amount of work being treasurer entails. Big thanks were also given to everyone who has given to the church financially.

Election of lay representatives to the PCC:

Thanks were given to everyone serving on the PCC for their time and energy. Special thanks were also given to those whose PCC term is coming to an end, including Jane Richards, and Sandra Cockram.

Due to personal reasons, Krysia Bateman, and Margaret Wade have also stepped down from serving on the PCC.

The PCC currently has vacancies for 4 full and 2 casual vacancies.

#### **PCC Elections:**

Phil Cooper: (not present) Simon Browning nominated, and Tim Clack seconded, all in favour.

Two further people have expressed interest to stand for the PCC – but have not been on the electoral roll long enough. They can be co-opted to the PCC and adopted as full members when they meet the criteria.

The floor was opened for anyone else would like to stand for PCC: No further applicants.

#### **Deanery Synod Rep Elections:**

Krysia Bateman is stepping down.

Dave Cockram is re-standing. He will continue in the role.

Open to floor for anyone else like to stand: no applicants.

### Appointment of the independent accounts examiners for this year:

Boyds Accountants were proposed to continue in the role by Tim Clack, Steve Bramley seconded – all in favour. No objections or abstentions.

#### **Questions and Discussion:**

An update was provided on Church House. Revd Andy Smith advised those attending that the past year has been challenging as several committee members have now stepped down. Heather Uncles is continuing as the booking secretary, and Andy is acting as Chair. (If anyone else interested in being chair, please speak with Andy Smith).

Steve Bramley is present as warden, and Hannah Clack is now the treasurer of Church House. Mandy Taylor is helping with grant applications for church house. Any grants will be used to help with structural repairs, including to the front doors, glazing, sky lights, kitchen refurb etc. and general improvements to facilities.

Mike Edwards is a new prospective curate who will be joining the church to work alongside Andy. He is expected to arrive around August and start in September.

Youth Worker – the vacancy is currently open for the role and applications are now arriving. A shortlist of applicants will be reviewed in a few weeks and interviews held. The PCC, Andy Smith and Simon Hill will shortlist the applicants. The church is aiming to potentially have someone in post within a few months. Funding is provided mainly through the Healthier Churches fund. Prayers were asked for the success of this venture.

### **Vicar's Report: (Revd Andy Smith)**

There have been some sad losses of people from the church in the past year, and reflection was given for those who have passed away.

Andy gave thanks for the joy of welcoming new people to the church, and the success of the Alpha course. This has resulted in people coming to faith and joining the church congregation, or exploring Christianity, and their beliefs further. There is lots to look forward to in the year ahead.

Andy is currently working on many ventures and projects, including planning for a new curate, The Point Community Café / Hub (that Mike may be involved in), recruitment of a new Youth and Children's worker, progression of the Ark fund, obtaining permission for, and installation of church carpets.

The proposed new church carpeting could not proceed earlier this year due to complications with the installation (a specialist fitter is needed) and appropriate permissions. Alternative options are now in discussion and Andy will be back in touch with the Archdeacon. New faculty applications will be submitted as needed.

#### Reflection:

The meeting closed with reflection on growth and change at St Peter's Church in the past year – particularly towards 'Making Christ Visible in Bengeworth'. Prayers were given for the future. Prayers to close.

### Structure, Governance and Management

### Parochial Church Council (PCC)

The PCC is a corporate body established by the Church of England. It operates under the Parochial Church Council Powers Measure. PCC members are appointed in accordance with the Church Representation Rules. All committed members of the congregation are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and consider standing for election to the PCC. The Parish of St Peter, Bengeworth is a parish in the Pershore and Evesham Deanery within the Diocese of Worcester.

### **Current PCC membership:**

The PCC is responsible for health and safety, safeguarding, child protection, and prevention of discrimination. The PCC is responsible for supporting the clergy in promoting the whole mission of the Church; pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical in the parish. The PCC also has responsibility for the upkeep of both the church building itself and of Church House (now, 'St Peter's Community Hall') on Broadway Road.

### **Standing Committee**

The PCC delegates some business to the Standing Committee comprised of Church Warden(s), Treasurer, Incumbent, and (if possible) two PCC members (nominated by the PCC). It is responsible for making certain decisions on behalf of the wider PCC, particularly decisions that are required urgently but have been agreed in principle by the PCC and who have duly authorized the Standing Committee to make a final decision.

### Safeguarding Statement

The PCC of St Peters Church, Bengeworth, is aware of its duty to have due regard to the House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults. In 2023 the PCC used the "Safeguarding Dashboard" provided by the Diocese as a way of self-assessment to seek to ensure it fulfils that duty.

### Safeguarding

It has been a challenging year regarding Safeguarding within the Church of England with the resignation of the Archbishop of Canterbury and the Bishop of Liverpool over historical issues. It does highlight the need for each of us to take responsibility for Safeguarding within our church. It is more important than ever to adhere to the strict recruiting and safeguarding procedures to keep people safe.

The Worcester Diocese team continue to be very knowledgeable and supportive of the Parishes and the PSO's and have robust safeguarding procedures in place. This was born out by the very positive outcome from the Safeguarding Audit that took place in July 2024. Thankyou to all those who completed the auditor's questionnaire to contribute



your views. You can read the full report of their findings and improvements for the future on the Worcester Diocese website.

As St Peter's family grows and new initiatives have begun, such as more children's work, the Creche and The Point, there have been lots more people recruited to new roles so more people have DBS clearance within the church and have Safeguarding Training. Please can I ask that when training is completed you let me know so that I can keep our records up to date. Thank you all for helping to keep our Church a safer place for everyone.

### St Peter's Electoral Roll Report

The electoral roll currently has 88 people listed. This year, a new roll was created to follow CofE guidance. Everyone previously listed on the church electoral roll was removed and all interested in being on the new roll had to reapply. The church made efforts to contact all of those on the previous roll via verbal announcements, e-newsletters, printed weekly sheets, posters, direct calls, emails, and letters for those we could not reach by other means. There has been a small decrease in the number of people on the new roll (down from 91 in 2024).

The proportion of non-resident members has increased, with 45 now listed. The number of parish residents currently stands at 43.

### Prayer

As part of the Body of Christ in Evesham our church family is called to pray. St Peter's prayer group has consistently met over the past year with a regular faithful number (7-9), occasionally more, gathering each Tuesday evening at 7:30pm for an hour. We have yet to finish by 8:30pm and more often than not it is closer to 9:00pm. Often our gathering will start with a shared portion of scripture which one of us has felt significant for the group or church family or a thought by one or more of the group which may lead us to pray in a certain direction. There have been occasions when we have simply started with a chat and gone straight into prayer waiting on the Holy Spirit's leading.

Luke 11v1: One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples." This is our ongoing request: that God would teach us to pray.

Our main focus is that St Peter's to be totally reliant of the leading of the Holy Spirit and to stand firm on God's Word, the Bible for the way forward and therefore bring Glory and Honour to our Father. It is imperative that we fully recognise that this is the Lord's Church and the fellowship will only be blessed if we follow His lead.



The group has been really excited as we have seen prayers, including healing and restoration answered. It has been our privilege to join with, and host on a couple of occasions, Evesham Prayer Compass quarterly prayer celebrations over the last year. It is so encouraging to join with so many others from the wider Evesham church fellowships to pray together ignoring our denominational differences and to seek God's will and purpose for our town.

When choosing the music for services, I always start with the Bible readings and consider the 'theme' for the service and the liturgical time of year. I produce a draft list of

I am happy for anyone to come discuss, make suggestions about the music, or tell me I am playing too slowly (you know who you are!).

I have been very happy at St Peters and feel God is going to do great things! I pray that he continues to use me in his service and thank everyone for their welcome, support and, I am sure, prayers, as the choir and I continue to move forward as part of God's family here.

### Worship @ 11am

Worship at 11am is about encountering God through sung worship, hearing from God's word, prayer, and breaking bread together as family. It has been a wonderful this year to have Mike supporting both services this year, especially with some excellent preaching. It's also been wonderful to hear a few other people leading us in prayer. I'm hopeful that in the coming months and years, there will be more people involved in leading gatherings, leading prayers, reading and preaching.

### Midweek Communion Services

Our change from Wednesday mornings (back) to Tuesdays last year sadly meant that one of our regulars from Abbey House could no longer attend, but it has nonetheless helped us provide a regular 10am midweek Communion service between the main Anglican Evesham churches on Tuesdays (here), Wednesdays (Hampton) and Thursdays (All Saints).

Now, our 'open church' café, 'The Point', which (from 11th March 2025) follows on from the

service, provides a welcome opportunity for members of the congregation to meet and share together after Communion. We hope that at least some of our regulars will stay on for the café and be part of the friendship-making and faith-sharing that we want to offer there.

#### Children and Youth

Our ministry with children, young people and their families has continued to grow in the last 12 months. We have augmented our Sunday morning provision for children's groups through the development of the creche area for our very youngest, and with the addition of a shorter session for older children after communion on the second Sunday of the month at the 11am service.

During Sunday services our children's group numbers vary from a handful (4/5) up to 20 at our larger services, and it's a delight to have welcomed many new families in the last year.

We are grateful for such a dedicated volunteer team who are passionate about leading our children in faith. Huge thanks go to: Sandra Thomas, Geraldine Pickett, Claire Hill and Jane Richards for their ministry in this last year.



Our Younite youth group for those in middle and high schools (10-18) is going from strength to strength, with a regular core of around 20 young people gathering each Friday evening. This ministry is in partnership with our friends at Evesham Baptist Church and the Vale Christian Centre. We are seeing real growth in faith among members of Younite whilst also seeing many new faces too. Recently, we've completed the Youth Alpha course, including a day away at the House of the Open Door. Many prayers for and with our youth group have been offered and we continue to have deep, honest discussions around faith each week.

### Churchwarden's Report

A busy twelve months from a Churchwarden's perspective meeting the demands of the usual and sometimes unusual life within the church environment. We have been pleased to host services for many organizations including Street Pastors, Prayer Compass and the Royal British Legion. We are also pleased to open our doors for the local schools to enjoy services and award ceremonies, and enjoyed hosting the Rotom charity and the Abaana choir from Uganda.

We do have a lively, welcoming, and growing community here at St. Peter's which I pray will continue well into the future. The opening of 'The Point' drop-in cafe also now allows us to further branch out into the community and open our doors to those perhaps less familiar with a church environment.

On the health and safety front, we are now free from pigeon droppings in the bell tower which has allowed the repair to the clock to be carried out. We did experience some damage to a tree in the churchyard during the storms of the Winter (we lost quite a heavy branch!) but fortunately there were no injuries or damage to the memorials. Our fire extinguishers have once again been checked and certified.

### Buildings and Fabric

**Bostock room/extension:** Since the last APCM the roof of the men's toilet has required further attention with the roofing company responsible for the original work returning on three occasions to carry out residual repairs. This work seems to have eventually fixed the areas affected, however some cosmetic work on the interior will still be required. We also had an issue with water ingress in one further spot of the Bostock room which has now been addressed by an alternative company having identified the root cause; a damaged leaded gully, which has now been replaced.

**Spire:** Since the last report on the condition of the spire, we have appointed a new quinquennial architect who has experience to bring to the table. The previous idea of netting the spire is being reconsidered as a matter of some urgency under the advice of our new architect who carried out a full quinquennial (5 yearly) report on the church in January of this year.

**Clock:** The saga of the church clock continued into this year as we awaited the various companies involved in maintenance and pest control to do what was required. You may have noticed the clock is now, at last, in good working order once again and we are



thankful to Patsy (and Greg) Chick who carry out the weekly winding to ensure the residents of Evesham are always on time...

**Main church:** There are many challenges when dealing with a building in excess of 153 years of age, not the least of these being the roof which has been prone to minor damage due to weather and some age-related problems. The good news is that the roof has had some necessary minor repairs to prevent further water ingress.
